Enter SC811 – your trusty sidekick for all things digging-related! This *FREE service* is like having a superhero hotline for underground utilities. Here's why you'll love them:

Getting Started is Easy! Just dial 811 anywhere in South Carolina or visit SC811.com. Share a few details about your project, and they'll take it from there. It's that simple!



Sit Back & Relax! Once you've put in your request, SC811 will send out the utility experts to mark the location of underground lines. Wait 3 business days for flags, or paint markings, and you're good to go!

Dig with Confidence! Armed with knowledge about where those utility lines are hiding, you can start your spring projects without worries.

Excavation is the #1 cause of pipeline damage!

In 2023, we responded to **184 incidents** involving damaged pipelines. Besides the obvious risks of digging into a gas line, there are also costs associated with damaged equipment, repairs and fines.

With SC811 by your side, there's no limit to what you can achieve with your spring projects. So go ahead, plant those flower beds, or build that dream patio – *the sky's the limit!* Just remember to call SC811 first, because nothing beats the feeling of knowing you're keeping your project, community, and planet safe and sound. Levelized Billing Program

Often referred to as budget billing, this plan sets a fixed monthly payment based on the past 12-months of gas usage at your residence. The Levelized Billing Program (LBP) allows you to stabilize your monthly energy costs by paying the same amount each month — preventing spikes in your bill. Instead of paying large bills in the winter and small bills in the summer, the amount is spread out over the year.



NO NEED TO RE-ENROLL EACH YEAR

Adjustments are made to LBP accounts each year after the May bill. The new payment amount will show on the next billing statement in June.



Safety Inspections

LEAK SURVEYS IN YOUR AREA

In order to ensure the safe delivery of natural gas to you and your neighbors, the Authority conducts safety inspections throughout our service territory. These atmospheric corrosion and meter inspections are part of our routine safety practices completed by Authority employees and/or contractors.



This spring, our trusted partner, Surview Field Services, will be completing inspections in the *Town of Sharon, Hickory Grove, McConnells & Rock Hill.*

Starting this summer, our inspectors will be in **Tega Cay** and the **northern areas of Fort Mill.**

The survey is completed outside your home or business and will likely occur during normal business hours between 8am and 5pm. The technician completing the inspection will never ask to enter your home, but may knock on your door if the gas meter is located behind your home or in a gated area.

YOU CAN HELP!

Please ensure that your meter is not blocked by shrubs or other debris. If you receive notice that our inspector needs access to a gated area, please respond immediately.

... AND POTENTIAL MISCONCEPTIONS

Get ready to welcome back the cicadas in 2024! These fascinating insects, known for their distinctive buzzing chorus, are set to emerge in large numbers across the South. While their presence may add a unique soundtrack to our outdoor experiences, there's a potential issue that homeowners and communities should be aware of – the risk of mistaking cicada sounds for a gas leak.



The Cicada Invasion

This year, cicada broods XII and XIX will have a "dual emergence," causing *trillions* of the noisy insects to appear simultaneously for the first time since 1803. Their distinctive buzzing, often likened to a loud, continuous hum, can fill the air for weeks, creating a natural spectacle.

The Gas Leak 🛛

While the sound of cicadas may be a familiar part of the summer landscape for many southerners, it can also lead to confusion and potential misunderstandings. The noise produced by these insects, particularly when congregating in large numbers, can sometimes be mistaken for the sound of a gas leak. This misinterpretation poses a risk, as it may delay or prevent the reporting of genuine gas leaks, which require immediate attention to ensure safety.

Recognizing the Difference

It's essential for homeowners and communities to be vigilant and educated about the distinction between cicada sounds and the signs of a gas leak. Some key points to remember include:

- Frequency and Duration: Cicada sounds are typically continuous and may last for several weeks during their emergence period. In contrast, the sound of a gas leak may be intermittent or sporadic, with no discernible pattern.
- Location: Cicadas are outdoor insects and are most commonly heard in trees, bushes, and other vegetation. Gas leaks, on the other hand, can occur anywhere, indoors and out.
- Smell and Visual Signs: Gas leaks are often accompanied by a distinct odor, similar to rotten eggs, and may also cause vegetation to wither or die. Cicadas, while noisy, do not produce any noticeable odor or visual signs of damage.

Reporting Concerns

If there's any doubt or suspicion of a gas leak, it's crucial to err on the side of caution and report it promptly to the YCNGA emergency response line dedicated to handling gas leak reports — 866-201-1001. We have trained professionals who can assess the situation and take necessary action to ensure safety.

Embracing Nature's Symphony

As we anticipate this once-ina-lifetime return of the cicadas in 2024, let's embrace the wonder of this natural phenomenon while remaining vigilant about safety. By understanding the sounds of nature and knowing how to differentiate them from potential hazards, we can enjoy the chorus of cicadas without any unnecessary concerns.





In the event of a gas leak — remember the 3 R's
